

KEY QUESTION:

What is a Macmillan nurse?

This fun task is linked to elements of the National Curriculum including PSHE/ PDMU/ Health and Wellbeing. Further links can be made to the *Every Child Matters Outcome Framework (2008)*.

Resources

- a photocopy of the activity sheet for each pupil
- colouring pencils or crayons

Desired learning outcomes

- Make connections and see relationships based on pictorial evidence.
- Understand what a Macmillan nurse does.

What to do

Spend time looking at a picture of a hospital with your pupils, describing what is in it, as well as why people may go to the hospital (as a patient or as a visitor). Describe what Macmillan does and the role of a Macmillan nurse (ie a nurse who helps people with an illness called cancer – giving them medicine and looking after them).

If time permits, you could show children a short movie clip of a Macmillan nurse and the *Who are Macmillan Cancer Support?* clip – both available to download from whybother.org.uk
