1.	Welcome	5 mins
2.	John Baron stated his intention to step down as Chair of the group. He made it clear that he would like to remain an Officer of the group and will continue to be supportive of the group.	10 mins
	John said he was happy to remain as Chair until a suitable new Chair is found, but would hope that this would be by the Summer.  The following MPs/Peers were elected as Officers, and John

It was agreed that the group should appoint a Treasurer.
Baroness Finlay volunteered to be the Treasurer for the
period of one year.

The accounts will be prepared by the Secretariat, and Baroness Finlay will meet the Secretariat once a quarter to review the accounts, which will include Secretariat staff time spent on the group.

#### 3. Review of the last year.

20 min

John highlighted the successes of the group over the year as well as some potential changes for the future. These included:

#### **APPGC** inquiry report

- John spoke of the report, which received over 80 written submissions and for which 2 oral evidence sessions were held and commented that the written submissions matched what was heard in the first oral evidence session. The focus of the report was on the cancer workforce and delays in transformation funding to Cancer Alliances because of the need for Alliances to show progress in the 62-day wait standard. John raised this at PMQs and will be meeting with the Prime Minister in March to discuss this issue.
- John commented that the report was hard-hitting and held the Government to account, with the Minister having to answer questions about it.
- John made it clear that the Chair and Officers take responsibility for the report.

#### **Summer Reception**

- John spoke about the successful Summer Reception where the 20 most improved CCGs in regard to oneyear survival rates were invited and praised. The group agreed that it was the improvement that mattered.
- The group agreed that in the future, it should try and involve Cancer Alliances more. The Secretariat noted this and will ensure that Alliances are involved in this year's Summer Reception.

#### **Britain Against Cancer**

- The group agreed that Britain Against Cancer 2017 was very successful.
- John raised some concerns about breakout sessions which was echoed by other members of the group and the Secretariat said this was also in the feedback from delegates. It was agreed that there wouldn't be breakout sessions next year.
- Baroness Finlay suggested instead of breakout sessions, that speakers were allowed 5 – 10 minutes on the stage, followed by questions. Speakers would have to submit their topic beforehand and a brief outline of what they would talk about. The group liked

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	this idea and also agreed that better audience engagement is needed. They agreed this would be considered in plans for Britain Against Cancer this year.	
	Comments from Baroness Finlay:	
	<ul> <li>Baroness Finlay had to leave the meeting early and noted a couple of points before she left. She commented that the Secretariat and members of the stakeholder group should try and give the Officers advanced warning of any upcoming publications, reports or media so that Peers can table topical questions. She also commented that she wanted the group to focus more on prevention.</li> </ul>	
4.	Future plans	15 min
	<ul> <li>The general focus for the year will continue to be on the Cancer Strategy, particularly because of the depth of evidence the group has from the Inquiry report. This Cancer Strategy will also be the focus of Britain Against Cancer.</li> <li>The group agreed to the work plan (at bottom of the minutes).</li> <li>Chris commented that with GDPR imminent, some focus on data would be appropriate. It was acknowledged that this was raised as an issue within the report.</li> <li>The group also raised the need to make sure rarer cancers were also fully represented by the APPGC. This will be considered in the work of the group going forward.</li> <li>The group also agreed that the APPGC should meet with other cancer APPGs to see where there is room for potential collaboration. The Secretariat will arrange this meeting.</li> <li>John raised the need to submit more questions for Oral Health Questions.</li> <li>The group also discussed putting it for more urgent and topical questions – the mechanism of achieving this was discussed later in new ways of working.</li> </ul>	
5.	Future methods of operating	10 min
	Whilst the group is very transparent, John raised the issue of greater scrutiny of charities and APPGs, and therefore how the group functions, particularly in relation to the Secretariat.  Moira Fraser (Secretariat) explained this in further detail, stating that Macmillan staff time in providing the Secretariat was greater than what it was planned to be and that in providing the Secretariat, there were times when the work involved required resources beyond Macmillan's expertise (for example issues around prevention and research).	
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The Secretariat stated they were keen to support the APPGC in being as ambitious as possible, in order to do this:

- The Stakeholder Group will be opened up some Stakeholders have expertise in areas that Macmillan don't and so the group would draw upon their expertise where necessary. The Secretariat will set up a meeting with the Stakeholder Group and will invite potential new stakeholders, and will discuss this new way of working with them. There will also be more opportunities throughout the year for the Stakeholder Group and stakeholders will be thanked publicly for any support they give to the APPGC. The group will also consider more collaborating with the Cancer Campaigning group (as well as other Cancer APPGs, as mentioned above).
- Greater collaboration with the Stakeholder Group can also help ensure better preparation for urgent/topical questions, with relevant Stakeholders informing the APPGC Officers of upcoming media and/or reports.
- In 2018, Britain Against Cancer will be projectmanaged by the Secretariat, but gaining sponsorship will be outsourced to an external company. After 2018, an external events team will run Britain Against Cancer. There will be tweaks to the format, including getting rid of breakout sessions so that BAC can be delivered within budget.

The APPGC Officers agreed that these were sensible suggestions and were happy for the group to work under these new conditions.

#### 6. Accounts

David Tredinnick asked about the funding of the group and Britain Against Cancer.

Amy MacConnachie explained that Secretariat staff time is a gift in kind from Macmillan. Britain Against Cancer and the Summer Reception were funded by money raised from the previous year's Britain Against Cancer (through delegate fees, exhibition stands and sponsorship). Following BAC 2017, we have £71k in the bank for 2018. This includes £10k contingency.

We can book the Lecture Hall & Library, where we would have the exhibition and lunch with 3 refreshment breaks for roughly £45k with VAT. Doesn't include extras like AV, publication of a programme or report.

The APPGC can pay for a 'belts and braces' Britain Against Cancer and limited extra activities across the year.

It was clear that Pharmaceutical companies that sponsored Britain Against Cancer in no way shaped the conference or influenced the group, and John has made a point of not meeting with these companies except to discuss general issues of interest to the cancer sector. 5 min


7.	AOB	10 mins
	David Tredinnick raised the issue of complimentary therapies and that the group should look at this more. Amy, John and Baroness Morgan noted his point and said that this would be encompassed through work around the Recovery Package. They also stressed the importance insuring the implementation of the Cancer Strategy so that the system is working, in order to allow things such as complimentary therapies to then become a priority.	
	Baroness Morgan raised that the group needs to focus more on prevention. This was noted and the group agreed that this was in-line with the work around the stakeholder group, where there was more cancer prevention expertise.
