

# Briefing for CCGs: responding to the cancer ratings in the Improvement and Assessment Framework 2016/17

#### Introduction

This briefing is to help CCGs responding to their recently published 'cancer rating', a baseline measure as part of the new <u>CCG Improvement and Assessment Framework</u> (CCG IAF) for 2016/17. It signposts to useful resources, data sources and suggested improvement strategies specific to the four metrics included in the cancer clinical priority area of the CCG IAF.

#### Background

The <u>CCG IAF</u> brings together the NHS Constitution and other core performance and financial indicators, outcome goals and transformational challenges. A new addition is a CCG rating for each of six clinical priority areas: cancer; mental health; dementia; learning disabilities; diabetes; maternity. The data for the agreed indicators for these clinical areas is already publically available on 'MyNHS'.

#### Cancer rating in the CCG IAF

There are four indicators that make up the cancer rating:

- 1. One-year survival (from all cancers)
- 2. Cancers (all) diagnosed at stage 1 and 2 (with supporting measure of % of cancers with staging data)
- 3. People with urgent GP referral having first definitive treatment for cancer within 62 days of referral
- 4. Cancer patient experience (based on the Cancer Patient Experience Survey 2014 question "Overall, how would you rate your care?")

#### Alignment with other national activity on cancer

The action plan for <u>Achieving World Class Cancer Outcomes: Taking the Strategy Forward</u> was published in May. This sets out the following priorities: Prevention and public health; Earlier and faster diagnosis; Patient experience; Living with and beyond cancer; High quality modern services; Transforming commissioning, provision and accountability.

To support the strategy, and the CCG IAF, Public Health England has developed a new data tool – <u>the Cancer Dashboard</u> – bringing together key cancer data at CCG and provider level. The tool can be used by local planners to look at their performance in more detail.

#### Driving improvements against the four cancer indicators

These baseline results for CCGs will be a marker for improvement for the CCG IAF 2016/17. Signposted below are useful resources which include suggestions of how CCGs can drive improvements against these metrics, as well as links to sources of local data.
