A RECORD BREAKING YEAR

Thanks to supporters like you, Macmillan raised more money and helped more people affected by cancer than ever before in 2013. It was a fantastic year. And in this leaflet, you can see some of the great things we achieved together in only 12 months.

Fundraising highlights

£183m

is the amount we raised together – **£33m** more than the year before.

£20m



was raised by the World's Biggest Coffee Morning – that's **£5m** more than in 2012.

£2.3m

was raised by **30,000** people who gave up alcohol for our first ever Go Sober for October.

£1.25m



was raised by **31,000** people getting together for our new event, A Really Good Night In.

668,324

people were helped by our **5,229** healthcare professionals, including our **3,500** nurses.
