


Charleston (1920s)

The dance is named after the city of Charleston in South Carolina.




Sattiyra Indian classical dancing (15th century)

The Sattriya is one of eight traditional Indian dances.




Disco (1970s)

Disco music became popular in the 1970s, and the dance moves were created to go with it.




Gangnam style (2000s)

The name refers to a lifestyle associated with the Gangnam District of Seoul, South Korea.




Mambo (1930s)

The Mambo is a Latin dance of Cuba. It is a favourite of ballroom audiences.




Sailor's hornpipe (17th century)
